

Dock Chair Report ...

We are entering the month when preparations for launching our boats begins with hopes for warmer weather. As we ready our boats, there are a number of tasks to tackle in preparation for docks in. A project to prepare the sailing school float-

ing dock has been initiated. Thanks to Chris Essig, Mathias Essig, Len McIntosh, Troy Nickerson and Alan Crozier for their efforts in attaching floats, inspecting the dock boards, removing some for replacement and ensuring screws and nails are well fastened.

With the assistance of Larry Richardson, I have been working on a comprehensive Procedural manual for the position of Dock Chair. It outlines the various ongoing responsibilities and tasks associated with this position and identifies key roles for volunteers needed for the ongoing maintenance and upkeep of the docks and as well as annual docks in and docks out days.

This year, an online signup sheet has been designed and will be available to members to make known their availability for the April 27th docks in day. An email will go out to all members with a link for you to sign on for the day. It will outline the various ways one can volunteer. We are asking that you check off which of these jobs you would be willing to do on the day. I will take the information collected and assign you to a specific role so that you will be aware in advance what you will be doing, in what location, and what time your assistance will be required.

The positions available for sign up are:

SIGNAL PERSON:

- Is the Lead Hand in the dock launch area
- Will work with the crane operator and must have knowledge of hand signals to work in conjunction with the crane operator
- Oversees safety in the area. Hard hat required.

CRANE-TO-DOCK SETTERS:

 Works attaching the lifting jaws to the docks ready for the crane to lift. Hard hat required.

LEAD DOCKS FROM CRANE-TO-DOCK:

• Lead the lifted dock to the launch area. Hard hat re-

quired.

PREPARE DOCKS FOR TOWING:

 Set line on the docks and hand off to tow boat. Hard hat and PFD required.

TOW BOAT DRIVER:

Operates the boat towing the docks to the designated area. PFD required.

TOW BOAT ASSIST:

 Receive lines from the prep crew and hand the line to the member in the receiving area. PFD required.

DOCK ASSEMBLY LEAD HAND:

Is in charge of A or C dock area and oversees safety.

RECEIVING DOCK FROM TOW BOAT:

 Receive the line from the tow boat and guide dock to the dock assemblers. PFD required.

JOINING DOCKS:

 Align docks and insert rod and secure with pin. PDF required; knee pads recommended.

SECURE DOCKS:

- Hold dock in place while it is being assembled.
- Secure dock to wall or post. PDF required when by the water.

COFFEE RUNNER:

• Water the troops :)

WIFI - Greg and I took a deeper look at our current networking equipment and moved it into a closet of the office in support of the office refresh work being lead by Richard. As a result, we've started improvements with our club WIFI. You will now see a **DYC Guest** available to connect with. The password is available upon request in the lounge.

Phones - We have completed the consolidation of phone lines for the club. Our club number (905) 934-8325 has been moved to our main phone service provider. You won't notice any changes when calling the club. You will still hear Leah Brown's voice routing your call, but when the club calls out it will also be the (905) 934-8325 that you see on your display in place of the Brampton number we had previously. If you do call in and listen to the prompts, you will notice a new option for our Youth Sailing School at extension 25 this provides those interested in our programme to be connected directly with the Youth Sailing School committee and for parents to communicate with our instructors throughout the summer.


















David was born and raised in Bath, England with an older brother, John. Rugby was his sport but he liked swimming and chess. His dad, a navy man himself, encouraged David to become an apprentice artificer in the British Royal Navy. He trained as a metal smith and engineer and travelled the world on boats and submarines. He ended his naval career as a Chief Petty Officer on the Valiant, the first British nuclear submarine. In Caledonia, Scotland David met his wife Terry, a pay write also in the navy. They had Tracey and Paul-Ross and lived in and around Portsmouth where he was stationed. In 1968 the family moved to Mississauga, Canada. He had various positions in Canada built on his naval experience, draftsman, inspector for boiler and machinery for Royal Insurance and also the government.

David was a steady, thorough and safety conscious worker; any job worth doing was worth doing well, although sometimes slowly! But whatever he was doing, you would generally hear him whistling away, happy as a clam. He completely renovated 4 homes himself, building decks and creating pleasing gardens to enjoy observing and feeding the wild animals that came to visit and the pets he had. And he loved planning all these projects on his graph paper pad that was never far away. When he wanted to explain something, out came the graph paper and he would proceed to sketch things out. He was a talented man, he could build or fix almost anything, which his family appreciated and benefited from often. It came in handy in 1994 when his son lured him to Bermuda to help him with his business. The family had grown to 5 grandkids by then with Rebecca, Spencer, Aram, Simon, and Troy. Many happy summer vacations were spent in Bermuda playing at Horseshoe Bay Beach. When they returned from Bermuda in 2002 he retired and they moved to Erin but in 2007 they settled happily in Fonthill.

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
