

Log of Events - A Hip Hip Story ...

Hip Hip chases line honors in a race around the Scotch Bonnet course of the Lake Ontario 300 Race (by Leigh Brown)

Friday 8:30 - Tom picks up Leigh and brings him, his things and an alternate sail that he had picked up the day before from Sportech where some repairs were made to it.

Friday 9:30 - The sail gets measured and put onto Hip Hip. Safety harness, lanyards and other safety swag are borrowed from Larry Hildebrandt to keep us safe. Thanks Larry.

Friday 11:30 - Paul and Leigh leave DYC docks and motor across the lake to PCYC Friday

Friday 15:30 - Hip Hip gets her hull and rudder shaved. Team effort, Leigh in the water with a rope tied in a loop to sit on and Paul held and walked Leigh around the boat to remove the growth.

Friday 17:00 - Team Hip Hip officially checks into the LO300 Race.

Friday 19:00 - Skippers Meeting - Leigh made a recording of this in case anyone wants a copy of the 45 minute overview of the race.

Saturday 8:30 - Tom and Mike pull into PCYC with the rest of the provisions. (They came by ground transportation.)

Saturday 10:00 - Hip Hip unties the lines and makes way to the LO300 race committee boat, to provide them with our sail numbers and boat name and raise the main in preparation for the start of the two and a half day Lake Ontario 190 NM Race.

Saturday 11:06 - SOG 5.0kn DTF 195nm - Race Start - Not the best of starts Hip Hip has ever seen, crossing the line 60 whole seconds after the horn, but at full speed and determination.

Saturday 11:15 SOG 4.5 DTF 193nm - Fender overboard, damn it. Well there is nothing that can be done: we are racing now and nothing will keep skipper Tom from his goal of line honors.

Saturday 11:45 SOG 4.0kn DTF 191nm - Rounded Humberview mark 6th in line honors.

Saturday 14:00 SOG 2.2kn DTF 185nm - Leigh made the team some pretty simple (plain) wraps with some Costco meats and cheese slices. It's a good thing there was some mustard on board:) Saturday 19:30 SOG 6.0kn DTF 160nm - Leigh put some Costco chicken wrapped asparagus and cheese on the BBQ.

Saturday 21:00 SOG 5.1kn DTF 153nm - Amazing Sunset. Mike and Leigh start their three hours on night shift.

Sunday 10:00 SOG 0.9kn DTF 119nm Hot - Mike comes up with a clever way to get wet and cool off without having to practice a man overboard drill. Using a bucket tied to a rope, he scooped up cool water from the lake and began bathing in it one body part at a time until he finally decided to just soak his hat and shirt and put them right back on his body. We also found some super soakers deep in the locker and used them to keep cool spraying straight up in the air letting it artificially rain back down on us.

Sunday 16:00 SOG 3.0kn DTF 101nm - We round our Second mark, Scotch Bonnet Island which is basically slate stone with a ruined stone lighthouse now marked with a light on a steel tower. The entire island is no more than 50 yards by 30 yards and is now inhabited by thousands of birds. It was nice to see the competitors converging on a common goal. We get spread out over the lake and sometimes think we may not heading to the right mark. As the mark gets closer so does the fleet and we are all rated by the turn. We are in sixth place for line honors.

Sunday 21:00 SOG 3.4kn DTF 92nm - Another amazing sunset

Sunday 23:00 SOG 2.7kn DTF 83nm - Venus beside a quarter moon set at the same time.

Monday 00:30 SOG 3.8kn DTF 79nm - Mike and Leigh finish watching RAMPAGE as the stars show off shooting through the sky.

Monday 02:00 SOG 4.8kn 73DTF nm - The lake is still but there is a good breeze passing through allowing, Hip Hip to cut through the night waters making excellent gains.

Monday 3:00 SOG 4.8kn DTF 67nm - Mike and Leigh are having such a great run they decide to let Paul and Tom sleep through their watch. Watching the lights of Doralla getting closer as we search for speed



Monday 5:50 SOG 5.5kn DTF 54nm - Sunrise

Monday 09:30 SOG 3.8 DTF 35.4nm - Have now taken the lead for line honors.

Monday 11:00 SOG 0.7kn DTF 33.4 - Wind has died. We all want to jump in the lake but are uncertain if it is legal according to the rules and so we cool on the shady side of the sails when possible .

Monday 1:00 SOG 4.0kn DTF 31.9nm - two hours spinning in place not making much ground. We have a tacking war with a trimaran from the main duck course.

Monday 14:00 SOG 2.0kn DTF 29.6nm - Wind filling in as forecasted by George, our onshore support. We quickly realize that that we will need to make a sail change and reef the main. Paul lays out the steps and our skipper assigns roles to each of his crew members. 10 mins or so later we have our head sail changes and main reefed. Not too bad for first timers says Paul the instructor and in real world conditions at that.

Monday 14:40 SOG 8.0kn DTF 26.6nm - Top speed for the race 8 knots.

Monday 14:50 SOG 6.9kn DTF 26.0nm - We round the Niagara on the Lake mark in first place line honors and head up wind with our number 3 headsail and reefed main.

Monday 13:30 SOG 7.3kn DTF 22.4nm - Winds begin to die and we are changing the headsail back again.

Monday 16:00 - The non white sail boats in pursuit start flying their spinnakers.

Monday 18:00 SOG 3.2kn DTF 10.0nm - Wind slowly begins circling behind us from the south and we're able to flip the main and go Wing on wing. We were threatened by the flying sails but hold our position

Monday 18:30 SOG 4.5kn DTF 8.0nm- Leigh up the mast to reset a batton three quarters up the sail. Failing that we would not be able to tack or reef the main and it was a good thing, because we did not

expect what came next.

Monday 19:00 SOG 2.6kn DTF 6.2nm- SQUALL. 50kn of wind on the nose. We see it coming and prepared for battle. Clipping in, reefing main and furling the jib.

Monday 20:00 SOG **-0.4kn** DTF 4.9nm- SQUALL passes. 0kn of wind again. 4-5 foot wave on the nose. No steerage and we are being pushed away from the finish. Consider using anchor but we are in 250 feet of water.

Monday 20:35 SOG 1.0kn DTF 5.1nm- Wind again.

Monday 20:55 SOG 4.4kn DTF 3.5nm - Sunsets as we begin to make a run for the finish and prepare to call in to the race committee to let them know that Hip Hip is coming in. That's when we hear over the vhf, "Shore Committee, Shore Committee, Shore Committee.... This is sailing vessel Doralla. - This is Shore Committee, go ahead Doralla. - We just wanted to let you know that we are within 3 nautical miles from the finish line." Our heads all popped out of the cockpit looking forward and see that Doralla is the only boat who when the squall hit us tacked port side and had better wind.

Monday 22:01 SOG 3.0kn DTF 0nm - Finish second in line honours.

Getting Rid of Ants on Your Boat (or Anywhere)

I have been asked for my recipe for ant bait, published in The Breeze many years ago. So I dug it out for this issue.

Borax is the most common ingredient in house ant control products, and get this: it's absolutely 100% natural. The best way (in my experience) to use Borax is to mix 1 cup of warm water with 1/2 cup of sugar, and 2 tablespoons of Borax. Then soak the Borax mixture up with cotton balls and place those cotton balls in small lids (like those from pill bottles) near any trails the ants have established. Feeding frenzy... tomorrow they'll be gone. We did this on the boat many years ago and have never seen an ant since. I knew there had to be a way to do this naturally!



Treasurer's Report ...

DYC is a "self-help" club. But what does that mean? Does volunteering still work? Do all current members appreciate that what DYC is today is the sum total of what volunteers built yesterday?

Yes, volunteering does still work - within limits. In a crisis or time-sensitive task, members will turn out and get the job done. The sandbagging, necessary last year, and the docks-in and docks-out events are great examples. Routine maintenance, upkeep and other necessary tasks are another story. It's too easy to let things slide until it's too late to maintain. Then, an often expensive, and unplanned purchase is necessary.

I grew up with the expression, "a stitch in time saves nine." It's a powerful expression of the value of attention to maintenance. Proper maintenance takes planning, regularity and work parties. This year there have been a lot of improvements, partially thanks to repairs to aging infrastructure which was brought on by the high-water incident. Without good methodical care, these improvements will begin to age unless we fundamentally pay attention and work to preserve them.


Electrical work on C dock, D dock and A dock are completed. The Harbour Office washrooms are done and look fantastic. The insurance funds have arrived in time to pay the contractors.

August 31 is DYC's fiscal year end. In September, we will begin preparing for the Year End Report. As well, membership invoices will be issued in September. If you are planning to leave the club, please let us know before the end of August. At the July board meeting a 2% increase in membership and dock fees was approved. There will be no change to the haul-out and winter storage fees. The increase in member fees is a prudent measure since we will likely have some unexpected expenses due to the pier work.

After a tough 2017, 2018 was kind to DYC. We have a good number of enthusiastic new members, and we continue to benefit from the efforts of long time members. As well, we recently learned the final pier work is beginning this year after docks out. Port Dalhousie is certainly getting spruced up.

The pier work will require some planning work by DYC and a member information night is scheduled for September 13.

At the July board meeting, I tabled copies of a 2007 proposal that had been crafted by Stewart Simpson and which outlined a proposed



DYC work-hour programme, and a copy of the Ashbridges Bay Yacht Club self-help work-hour programme. Both of these documents are thoughtful and comprehensive planning tools which would help DYC to reintroduce this concept. I do not know why the Simpson proposal did not gain acceptance. But I believe we must move towards this now, for two reasons; long time members who've been doing much of the work are getting tired, and two, our new enthusiastic members who've been pitching in with ideas and energy and work, may get discouraged unless more members are seen regularly pitching in.

DYC is what members make of it. We all have different talents. So the concept of self-help extends in every facet of DYC's operational needs, from planning to administration to physical work, DYC needs all of us.

One of the recent volunteer tasks has resulted in a new email system so that you can email board members. Please let the board know if you support a great looking, and member-led club, because without evidence of your support we cannot achieve this change in our club culture.












